Alderton Hall Lane Water Smells

Residents in Alderton Hall Lane contacted LRA Cllr Mick Stubbings about a horrible smell and polluted water that was running down Alderton Hall Lane. The water started on the grass verge outside the nursery in the grounds of Alderton Junior

School, then crossed the path and went into the drain.

Mick investigated to find the problem. He then reported it to the District Council Environmental Health team who sent someone out the next day. It is no longer a problem for now but may need further work. Mick will continue to monitor the situation.

Local Government restructure and elections - have your say

We have heard of the death of John Markham in Somerset. He was LRA District Cllr for St John's from 2002 to 2014. He was in his mid-late 80s.


Planning and Licensing

2 The Uplands

This application proposes a new self-build dwelling (resubmission of EPF/2928/20).

LRAPG has objected to this garden-grabbing proposal. Whilst this is an improvement on the last application, which was for two dwellings, this is still gardengrabbing. The Uplands is characterised by medium-sized dwellings with substantial gardens. The application will harm the character of The Uplands. The



building to the rear of 3 Church Hill is not a justification to permit it on The Uplands because that is a commercial property.

Reference <u>EPF/0064/25</u>. The formal consultation period ended 17 March, but you can still comment to the Council.



4-4a Valley Hill

This application proposes demolition of the existing buildings and erection of 3 two-storey buildings, with a commercial (Class E) unit fronting Valley Hill with a two-bed flat above, 2 two-bed dwellings at the rear, and 2 two-bed dwellings fronting Malvern Gardens.

LRAPG has objected to this poorly conceived application. The zinc clad building on Malvern Gardens is wholly out of character with the remainder of the street. The zinc should be changed

for a more sympathetic material. Units 3 and 4, by reason of their bulk, height and proximity, represent unacceptable backland development; the rooms are boxed in, some with no outlook. They are deficient of a reasonable standard of amenity and both should be deleted from the scheme. These dwellings are uncomfortably too close to neighbours and will cause overlooking and noise.

Overall, this is an overdevelopment of the site and permission should be refused.

Roads, Parking and Travel

Planned road closures

 York Hill - the road will be closed 31 March to 4 April from its junction with Kings Green to its junction with York Crescent for pipe laying works by Cadent.
 More <u>Church Lane</u> and <u>St Johns Road</u> - the roads will be closed 14 April to 7 May for works by Cadent.

Central Line future planned closures

There is also a detailed list of closures for the next six months in this document (PDF). There are some part closures of the Central Line during some weekends in every month during summer, so it may pay to check in advance if you are planning to attend any events in central London.

Tolls for the Blackwall and Silvertown tunnels from 7 April

With the Silvertown tunnel under the River Thames opening on 7 April, both the existing Blackwall and new Silvertown tunnels will be tolled from that date. Charges apply from 6am to 10pm 7 days a week and range from £1.50 to £10 per tunnel crossing, and you can pay online, auto pay on over the phone. More

Police, Fire and Crime

The police in February

Here is a snapshot showing some of the things Epping Forest District Officers have dealt with in January. They have:

- helped to find 18 people who were reported missing
- investigated 59 reports of antisocial behaviour.
- attended 61 road traffic collisions.
- investigated 165 reports of domestic violence incidents.
- solved 91 crimes.
- submitted 319 pieces of intelligence.



Shoplifter arrested

On 7 March police officers, conducting plain clothed patrols in the district to combat shoplifting, arrested a male shoplifter in Sainsbury's Debden. Following checks, he was banned from entering the store.

Shoplifter guilty

Following investigation by the police, a 50 year old man from Loughton was found guilty at Chelmsford Magistrates court on 9 counts of shoplifting which occurred in our district between October 2024 and December 2024. He has been banned for 18 months from Marks & Spencer in Epping and Loughton, ordered to pay £1600 in compensation and do 80 hours community service.

Jailed for theft, shoplifting and public order offences

A woman has been jailed for 12 weeks after she was charged with 7 offences, including theft, shoplifting and public order. The offences were committed between September 2024 and February 2025 in Debden, Epping, Harlow, Buckhurst Hill, and Loughton. Hertfordshire Police charged her with further offences from their area.

Ongoing patrols to combat flytipping

Police have completed more joint fly-tipping patrols with the District Council's Environment Officers and Epping Forest City of London Constables. 22 work vans were checked and 7 of them were reported for not having the correct waste carrying licences.

Police on the roads

In February, there were 9 lives lost and 54 serious casualties on Essex roads, with:

- 215 mobile phone offences
- 144 drink-drive arrests
- 115 drug-drive arrests
- 7464 road safety educational courses
- 644 community speed watch warning letters.

Over 4,300 uninsured vehicles taken off Essex roads last year

Essex Police officers seized over 4,300 uninsured vehicles in 2024. That's an average of 12 vehicles per day. Uninsured vehicles not only put other road users at

risk, but they can often be linked to other serious crimes, making their removal crucial for community safety. More

Securing your online accounts

2-step verification (2SV) will keep criminals out of your account – even if they know your password. Sometimes it's called 2-factor authentication (2FA) or multi-factor authentication (MFA). When you turn on 2SV, you will be asked to provide a 'second step', which is something that only you can access. This could be a code that's sent to you by text message, or created by an app.

For your most important accounts, such as email and social media accounts, 2SV is usually a free option. Security of your email is particularly important. If someone can take control of your email, this can also allow them to access other accounts that you have linked to your email address. More and how to enable 2SV.

As extra security, your email and social media passwords should be strong and different to all of your other passwords.

Ten golden rules to prevent fraud

The police suggests these ten golden rules to help you prevent fraud and beat the scammers:

- Be suspicious of all 'too good to be true' offers and deals. There are no guaranteed get-rich-quick schemes.
- Don't agree to offers or deals immediately. Insist on time to get independent or legal advice before making a decision.
- Don't hand over money or sign anything until you've checked someone's credentials and their company's.
- Never send money to anyone you don't know or trust, whether in the UK or abroad, or use methods of payment you're not comfortable with.
- Never give banking or personal details to anyone you don't know or trust. This information is valuable so make sure you protect it.
- Always log on to a website directly rather than clicking on links in an email.
- Don't just rely on glowing testimonials. Find solid, independent evidence of a company's success.
- Always get independent or legal advice if an offer involves money, time or commitment.
- If you spot a scam or have been scammed, report it and get help.
- Don't be embarrassed about reporting a scam. Because the scammers are cunning and clever there's no shame in being deceived. By reporting it, you'll make it more difficult for them to deceive others.

Annual Town Meeting

Residents were invited to the Annual Town Meeting in The Murray Hall on 19 April. Local groups, organisations and charities that were successful with their grant applications were present with displays, and Town Mayor



LRA CIIr Katie Valentine presented the awards to the Citizens of the Year.

Richard Church was named Citizen of the Year, recognising his dedication and voluntary work with the Scouts for over 38 years. The Town Mayor said, "Richard has continually delivered results that benefit the entire scouting community".

Frankie Gibney was declared Young Citizen of the Year, in recognition of his charitable endeavours and dedication to raise awareness and much needed funds. Katie commented on "the incredible contribution Frankie had made to the people of Loughton. He was a real inspiration".

A Certificate of Recognition was also presented by Katie to the daughter of Barbara Andrews, who was unable to attend. This celebrated her exceptional work going 'above and beyond' as a teacher for over 30 years at Hereward Primary School, helping the children of Loughton reach their potential.

Representatives from local groups, organisations and charities that were successful in their grant applications received certificates to mark their achievement, and had displays up for residents to browse. New Newmans Lane Children's Playground

The Town Council has opened the new Newmans Lane Playground, adjacent to Rectory Lane, with Town Mayor, LRA Cllr Katie Valentine, cutting the ribbon to declare the new facilities open.



The old playground, although functional, had been looking rather shabby, tired and lacked a number of accessible features that a modern playground should be providing.

On a very tight budget the Town Council was able to spend £95,000 on the playground revamp, and are very grateful to the District Council for providing £30,000 of this funding via the UK

Government's 'United Kingdom Prosperity Fund'.

The Newmans Lane playground is now the most inclusive play area in Loughton, with new and innovative play equipment. The new apparatus includes a 3 tower & slides play unit, a wheelchair accessible roundabout and an inclusive jeep. The new zip wire is also proving a popular attraction. The playground has been open for a few weeks now and has been very well received, with a significant increase in visitors (compared to the old playground). More, with photos.

On a sour note it was reported that a small section of safety surfacing underneath the multi-play unit had been damaged by arson. This would be repaired in due course. Unfortunately, there had also been incidents of graffiti at this early stage.

VE Day

Thursday 8 May marks 80 years since VE (Victory in Europe) Day when the Second World War came to an end in Europe.

The 80th anniversary of VE Day is a time for a nation to come together to learn about the stories of those that served and the VE Day generation, from the servicemen who fought, to children who were evacuated, and women on the home front. <u>More</u>

If you are planning a street party to celebrate VE Day the District Council will waive the fee normally associated with road closure applications for non-commercial events. $\underline{\mathsf{More}}$

There will a lighting of a beacon to commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day at Hillyfields on 8 May at 9pm which all residents are invited to attend.

Weekly Markets

As reported previously, the Town Council has been working towards establishing weekly food markets on the High Road.

The land to be used is a Public Highway and so is the responsibility of Essex County Council Highways. The Town Clerk is now applying for a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) to enable the markets to take place, with a projected June starting date.

Roding Valley Recreation Ground dog waste bins

The Town Council will fix notices to all dog waste bins at the Recreation Ground advising dog owners to deposit dog waste into general litter bins if the dog waste bins are full.

Roding Valley Recreation Ground tree planting

Tree whips will be planted at the Recreation Ground over coming weeks when resources and time allow, with any excess being used at Lady Whitakers Mead.

Leisure Centre boiler upgrade

Loughton Leisure Centre has undergone a significant upgrade with replacing its boilers, ensuring improved energy efficiency and sustainability. The District Council was awarded £300,000 by Sport England last year through the swimming pool support fund to support vital energy-saving improvements.



This funding has enabled the installation of new energy-efficient boilers, helping to reduce the centre's carbon footprint while maintaining a comfortable environment for users. <u>More</u>

Council homes energy upgrades

The District Council will be improving the energy efficiency of nearly 2,400 council homes between April 2025 and 2030. This initiative aims to help families reduce energy costs while enhancing the comfort and sustainability of their homes.

A range of improvements, including loft insulation top-ups, upgraded windows and doors, and solar panels, will boost the energy efficiency ratings of these properties to meet and exceed established standards. More

Climate Action - Have your say

The County Council has a <u>Climate Action Plan</u> to become a net-zero county council by 2050 and help make communities more resilient to the effects of climate change. This requires the support of everyone who lives, works and studies in the county to help reach these goals.

Home fire safety visits for those who are deaf or have hearing loss

Essex County Fire and Rescue Service provides free home fire safety visits and specialist alarm installations to those who are deaf or have hearing loss to help keep

them safe in their homes.

There are alarms designed specifically for people with hearing loss. These alarms, which include vibrating pads and flashing lights, provide valuable time to escape from a house fire - time that could save lives. More

Health and Wellbeing

Prescriptions warning

Residents are being advised to check prescriptions administered for any non-surgical cosmetic or aesthetic procedure, like botulinum toxin commonly known as Botox.

Any prescription should be given by someone who can legally prescribe the treatments in a face-to-face consultation with whoever the prescription is for. Ask to see the bottles/vials of liquid before treatment goes ahead. Any labels should have your name on it, like any other prescription. Your medication is for you and only you. More

Disposing of unused antibiotics

If you bin or flush old antibiotics, they could get into our water supplies and contribute to antibiotic resistance. Please take any unused medication to a pharmacy for free and safe disposal. More

Government Policy Changes and the Forest

The Government's recent initiatives to increase the number of houses being built in England and, in particular, affect the protection given to the Green Belt. These changes are in to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) which details the Government's policies that determine how housing and other developments are

controlled and implemented.

Help protect the Forest's swans

Please give swans a wide berth and ensure that your dog does not disturb them. This is important advice all year round but especially so in spring, Swans become highly protective of their nest sites and territories, with the males becoming particularly aggressive in spring with the large cobs defending their waters against dogs.



The nesting season is a vulnerable and tense time for all nesting birds, the more they can be left alone, the more likely they are to successfully raise a family. Please never be tempted to get close to take a photo. If you do take photos, use a zoom and ensure that you do not take images with identifiable locations and never share any nest locations.

Volunteers needed to monitor wildlife

Epping Forest is home to a vast array of species, from rare insects to breeding birds, butterflies, reptiles, and small mammals. If you're passionate about wildlife and enjoy spending time outdoors, you could become a vital part of our species surveying

efforts beginning this spring.

Volunteering opportunities include:

- Breeding bird surveys recording bird populations to track species health.
- Butterfly transects walking set routes to monitor butterfly numbers and trends.
- Grassland habitat assessments evaluating plant diversity.
- Reptile transects searching for slow worms, lizards, and grass snakes.
- Small mammal surveys monitoring populations of voles, mice, and shrews.

The bluebells are beginning to make their appearance in Epping Forest.

To enjoy the annual spectacle of the woodland floor carpeted in blue, it is really important not to trample these delicate plants, which means keeping to the paths, not stepping on the bluebells and not picking the flowers. This benefits these beautiful native wildflowers so that they can continue to be enjoyed by visitors and wildlife alike, this year and beyond.
