## LRA News

### Lucton's Field, Borders Lane

We are still waiting for the Planning Inspector's decision on Fairview Homes appeal against the District Council's failure to decide about their application to build flats on the field opposite the College. So residents were concerned when work started on the field; however, a resident asked the workers about it, and they said that they were installing a temporary mobile mast as the one in the College grounds has ceased to operate (there are provisions to allow for a temporary installations without the need for planning consent until the existing one is fixed). However, the works

appear more extensive than would be needed for a temporary mast and the District Council has been asked to investigate. [Background on our website](#)

### **Epping Forest College Middle Site, Borders Lane**

The old building is now being demolished. The developers applied for prior approval for removal of the old building and this wasn't objected to. Therefore what is being done is lawful and doesn't predicate the Inspector's decision, which is still awaited. [Background on our website](#).

### **Pyrles Lane site**

In 2013, the District Council, which owns the old nursery site to the rear of Pyrles Lane, proposed to develop it for housing. LRA Plans Group objected to this "backland" development but in 2015 a planning application was approved. However, that planning permission has expired and a new application will be needed (this will be passed unless some new objection applies).

The Council is now considering selling the site to Qualis, its wholly-owned development subsidiary. This was discussed at a Council committee meeting on June 8th – [here is the report](#). This development cannot take place without adversely affecting the Epping Forest Special Area of Conservation, a factor which the Council had completely omitted from its report.

### **Loughton Library**

We understand the much-delayed consultation on this project to demolish Loughton Library and provide a smaller library under a block of flats will take place in July.

### **High Beach helicopter base**

LRA Cllr Chris Pond says that the proposed return of Metropolitan Police helicopters to High Beach will create more pollution in the forest. LRA, local residents, and the District Council are also concerned about the extra noise and pollution the return of the base will create.

The air support unit moved from Lippitts Hill to a base on North Weald Airfield two years ago. It appears that neither residents nor the District Council can prevent the return, because the original planning permission is still valid. The National Police Air Service will remain at North Weald Airfield.

### **Debden Road Signposting**

A local resident reported that the signage for Debden Road was unclear and has led to problems for emergency services and delivery drivers.

LRA Cllr Caroline Pond raised this with the County Council. A new street sign was installed, although resident feedback was that wasn't quite in the right place. Caroline requested it to be moved, and this has now been done.



### **New Alderton Hill Speed Limit**

A new advisory speed limit of 20mph now at the bend on Alderton Hill. This resulted from a petition from residents at the top of the hill, where cars have repeatedly felled walls.

Residents along with LRA Cllr Chris Pond attended a highway surgery in the winter, and the new speed limit was later agreed.

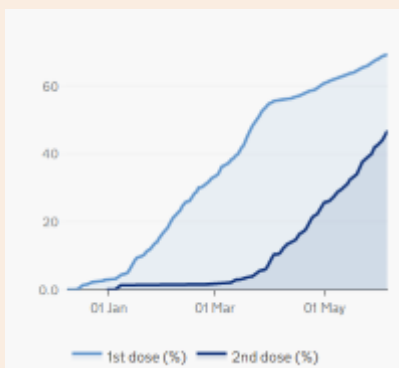
Coronavirus restrictions remain in place across the country, including for people who have been vaccinated. In England:

## ***Planning and Licensing***

[Read more on our website](#) about Planning and Licensing, the role of the LRA Plans Group (LRAPG), how to get more information and how to comment to the Town Council and the District Council.

The District Council takes the decisions on planning applications. The application will be decided upon by a Council Officer or by Cllrs in a District Council Planning Committee, and residents' comments on the proposals will be taken into account but not necessarily agreed with. This is a quasi-legal process, and decisions have to be taken **on planning grounds only**, based on the national planning legislation and the District Local Plan, whatever the views and feelings of the individual Cllrs involved.

*If you wish to comment, don't delay. The process is time critical with several stages along the way. If you wish to make comments please try to submit them before the deadline set by the Council. Although submissions can be made and have to be considered up to the time a decision is made, once the statutory deadline has passed, the application might be determined before your comments are received.*

The process for alcohol licensing applications is similar to the process for planning applications, except that objections must relate to one or more of [the four Licensing Objectives](#) (page 3, section 1.7) and any comments received after the end of the formal consultation period won't be taken into account by the District Council.

### **Higgins, 1 Langston Road**

It is proposed to change the Higgins office building into 57 flats. As part of the Government's reforms to "cut out planning red tape", offices can be changed to flats without the need for planning permission. This means we cannot take into account the impact of the new residences and car pollution on the Forest or question the principle of the change of use. However certain aspects of the changes need the prior approval of the Council such as flooding, natural lighting to the new flats and parking.

LRAPG has objected to the prior approval application because there is insufficient parking for the new flats and because of the likely effect of noise from nearby commercial premises on the intended occupants. The original planning permission includes a second office building on the site and, if this is built, it would block the windows and natural light to some of the new flats.

LRAPG has also noted that the original planning permission for 1 Langston Road included a number of details which had to be approved by the council ("conditions") before work started on the site; if these weren't submitted and approved then the existing building would be unlawful. Similarly, under a legal agreement signed by the owners, there should have been a travel plan for the building's occupants. LRAPG have asked the Council's planning officers to check, before they make any decision on this latest application, that all these things were actually done, as the Council cannot grant prior approval for a change of use to an unlawful building.

Application [EPF/1408/21](#). The formal consultation period ends on June 23rd.

### **Pizza Hut, 21 The Broadway**

MSAJ Pizza Ltd have applied for a new premises licence for a pizza delivery and take-away restaurant.

The Town Council, LRAPG and three local residents have objected to the application, which will be considered by the District Council on June 15th. The applicant applied for opening until 1am but has agreed with Essex Police to close at midnight Sunday to Thursday (both instore & deliveries) and on Friday and Saturday to close the shop doors at midnight, with home deliveries only until 1am, for telephone and online orders only.

*LRAPG comment: while the change in hours is an improvement, it would still mean residents in the flats above being disturbed by shop staff and delivery vehicles after midnight. If the application were to be granted licensing approval to open for home*

deliveries after midnight, they would also need separate planning permission for this, which LRAPG would also strongly oppose.

Reference [WK/202114377](#). The consultation period has ended.

### **Street trading on The Broadway**

The District Council has turned down [an application](#) (item 116) for a Street Trading Licence made by Debden Traders' Association, for shops or other traders to sell goods on The Broadway on the pavements outside the shops, Monday to Sunday 8am to 5pm. A street trading consent cannot be used as an extension of a shop, and Essex County Council had anyway objected to businesses expanding their selling areas in a way which would obstruct the public highway. The District Council do not currently have a markets policy. They are planning to devise and consult on one.

## **Police and Crime**

### **Recent police activity**

- The Community Policing Team provided reassurance patrols and engagement with local Jewish communities across the District following a recent hate incident in Chigwell (two people have been charged in connection with this).

- In response to ongoing anti-social behaviour (ASB) concerns, Special Constables have been supporting local officers with high visibility patrols in Debden, and the Special Inspector visited The Broadway and talked with a number of local businesses.
- The Community Policing Team continued to pay attention to Loughton tube station, and surrounding areas, to deter criminality and ASB.
- Complaints have been received about ASB and violence in Station Road, and LRA Cllr Chris Pond has asked the local Inspector to step up the attention given to this road.



### Essex Police jail drug dealer

Operation Raptor officers have succeeded in jailing a man for six years for dealing cocaine in Loughton. Phones, drugs, Rolex watches and cash were seized from his address. [More](#).

As of 31st May, they have received over 6 million such reports, and that has allowed them to remove more than 45,000 scams and take down 90,000 malicious URLs.

### Stolen vehicles

Stolen vehicles can often be parked up and left for several days at a time. If you feel something isn't right about a parked vehicle, please report it using [Live Chat](#) (7am-11pm) or by calling 101 (if you feel a crime is in progress, always dial 999).

Vehicles recently stolen can also be driven to 'chop shop' locations and quickly dismantled. If you notice lots of high value vehicles arriving at a location near you

and not leaving, or any other unusual activity, please report it for investigation to the police, or anonymously using [CrimeStoppers](#).

## Council News

### Noisy dogs

A persistently noisy dog can make life very difficult for neighbours and can also mean that the dog is in distress. The District Council will not tolerate irresponsible pet owners who allow dogs to bark unchecked. Recently, noisy dogs cost a Waltham Abbey man £1,347 at Chelmsford Magistrates Court for breach of a Noise Abatement Notice and Community Protection Notice. [More](#).

## Local News

### Methodist Church hit again – and again

At the end of last month a car went out of control as it came down Traps Hill and shot across the High Road, over a low wall, and into the glass front of the Church. No-one was seriously injured (the Church suffered a similar incident nine years ago).

At the start of this month, another accident outside the church led to further damage to the wall but as far as we know there were no serious injuries.

### **Recycling Green Waste**

Have you ever wondered what happens to the green waste collected at your recycling centre?

It's taken to Birch Airfield composting site near Colchester, and some of it is being reused again to mulch newly planted trees and hedgerows in Tendring (this site in St Osyth is one of the driest fields in the entire Country – so 'mulch' needed for the young trees!)

### **Improving our wildlife**

Epping Forest Countrycare visited an area next to Willingale Road Allotment early last month to carry out a volunteer work session. As with previous sessions at this site, grass was cut and areas covered in brambles were cut-back. They created a pathway through the section of brambles close to the border with Debden Park High School. Countrycare Officers placed a number of refugia (mats to encourage habitat for reptiles and insects) around the site; a couple of weeks later many had become homes to slow worms, common lizards and a grass snake (all of them, of course, harmless to people).

## ***Health and Wellbeing***

### **Whipps Cross Hospital redevelopment – message from Action4Whipps**

Action4Whipps is a group of concerned residents who are asking for help to secure the new Whipps Cross hospital to be the hospital they believe we shall all need in the future. It will need enough beds (not 51 fewer than now), sufficient space for services

and enough land for expansion in the future. The ever-growing population within the hospital's catchment area leads them to believe that action is needed to act now in the planning stages of the building process, before all decisions are set in stone. They want to preserve enough land from housing development for future expansion of the hospital needs. For more, and how to give your views, see [here](#).

## Epping Forest

### Visiting Epping Forest and our Green Spaces

The latest update for visiting Epping Forest is in [Forest Focus](#) (scroll down to the Covid-19 section). Most facilities are now open, with some restrictions in place.



Remember that charging for some car parks in the Forest have been [introduced](#). The new system is cashless, accepting payments through the RingGo app or by card (at High Beach only). You may want to [set up the RingGo app and an account](#) before you go, however not all car parks are being charged for - [check here first](#) under 'Are all Forest car parks included').

Visitors are asked to take litter home to dispose of it responsibly there, rather than use the litter bins, which are likely to become full very quickly at this time, so please remember to keep our forest tidy!

Also don't forget Roding Valley Meadows which is on Loughton's doorstep. It is part of the 160 acre Roding Valley Nature Reserve which comprises the largest surviving area of traditionally managed river-valley habitat in Essex and follows the River Roding. More [here](#) and [here](#).



### Do not disturb

Fallow deer have been an important aspect of the Forest's ecology for centuries, browsing on new growth and helping to maintain the wood pasture that is such an important feature of Epping Forest. Fallow fawns are born in the summer so it is very important that dogs are kept under close control when visiting the Forest at this time of year. You

may come across fawns alone in the undergrowth and wonder if they have been abandoned. Please do not disturb these young deer as they have been safely hidden while the mother feeds close by. She will return to the fawn once you have gone.
